### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENT

#### REVENUES

**Membership Fees:** Reflects all 2003 membership fees collected in all categories of membership: individual, organization, affiliate and sustaining memberships.

**Workshop Fees:** Reflects fees collected for workshops held in 2003.

**Grants:** this category reflects grants received from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), All Kids Count (AKC) and Wyeth Vaccines.

#### EXPENDITURES

**Personnel Services:** reflects expenses to cover salary and benefits for three (3) full time staff: Executive Director, Resource Manager and Research and Development Manager.

**Consultant/Subcontractor Fees:** reflects expenses to

cover consultant fees including a writer/editor, a graphic designer and the web site administrator/ designer. Also covers the Every Child By Two (ECBT) subcontract expenses.

**Printing:** covers costs incurred for printing various resource toolkits and guides as well as costs for reproduction of materials for meetings and workshops.

**Travel:** covers costs incurred for travel to conferences and project-related meetings by three (3) AIRA staff, the AIRA President, and Board of Director members and workshop leaders as approved by the funding source.

**Meetings:** covers costs for grant approved meetings and workshops.

**Indirect Costs:** MHRA overhead costs.

## A Letter From the President

*It's been just over ten years since immunization registries began to develop in earnest. The national push to address systemic barriers to high and sustained immunization coverage levels led naturally to registries as a powerful tool to overcome many of those barriers. Since that time, registries have had to forge new territory over and over again.*

*Many of the same barriers and issues are being discussed again with the emergence of the National Health Information Infrastructure (NHII), electronic health records, and increased integration and data sharing across organizations.*

Our thanks to Ina Kichen, Research and Development Manager, for all her creative and hard work on AIRA's presence!*

*Another important step forward this year was the Committee on Immunization Registry Standards and Electronic Transactions (CIRSET) coming under the umbrella of AIRA. Years ago, CIRSET created the initial implementation guide for using HL7 to transmit immunization data. Today, with HL7 and other transaction and messaging standards*

*more important than ever, CIRSET will help guide the registry community in preparing for and participating in the information sharing environment evolving around us. Welcome to the AIRA family!*

*Ground-breaking work was also done this year through AIRA's Emergency Preparedness and Response Committee, thanks in large part to the vision and energy of its co-chairs Karen Nikolai and Paula Soper.*

*AIRA's many other committees—Provider Participation, PROW, Technical, Managed Care, and Education—are the backbone of this organization and the reason for its effectiveness. If you are not already a member of one of these groups, please consider joining whichever best addresses your interests and needs. I'm sure you will find the benefits of participating far outweigh the time spent.*

## Activity Highlights: July 2003 to June 2004

### I. Providing Leadership

*AIRA members, including over 100 public health professionals, computer consultants, managed care representatives, and community leaders, share resources and promote partnerships to advance the development, sustainability and use of immunization registries across the nation.*

#### Programmatic Registry Operations Workgroup (PROW) Project

The purpose of the PROW project is to promote the use of immunization registries by immunization programs to increase the effectiveness of core immunization program components, including assessment, provider quality assurance and VFC. Thirteen (13) immunization registry projects participated as PROW demonstration sites implementing the *Standards of Excellence* over the past year. Sites included the Alabama Department of Public Health Immunization Program, Contra Costa Health Services, County of San Diego HHS Agency Immunization Program, Central Valley Immunization Information System, Georgia Registry of Immunization Transactions & Services, Houston-Harris County Immunization Registry, Massachusetts Department of Public Health Division of Epidemiology and Immunization, Minnesota Department of Health, NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene Citywide Immunization Registry, Oregon Immunization ALERT Program, Puerto Rico Immunization Program, Utah Department of Health/USIIS Program and the Wisconsin Immunization Registry. In partnership with the CDC/NIP and AIM, AIRA secured endorsement in the form of a resolution from the National Vaccine Advisory Committee (NVAC). Text of the resolution is posted on the AIRA web site at [www.immregistries.org](http://www.immregistries.org). Progress on implementation of the *Standards of Excellence* was reported at the 2004 Immunization Program Manager's Annual Meeting and during breakout sessions at the 2003 Immunization Registry Conference (IRC) and the 2004 National Immunization Conference (NIC). A final report, *The Centers of Excellence*, will be prepared for distribution at the 2004 IRC. A debriefing meeting will also be held at the 2004 IRC to outline strategies and plans for full implementation of the *Standards* by immunization registries and programs.

#### 2004 Immunization Registry Conference (IRC) – External Planning Committee

AIRA, along with partner organizations, Every Child By Two (ECBT), All Kids Count /Public Health Informatics Institute (AKC/PHII), and the Committee on Immunization Registry Standards for Electronic

Transactions (CIRSET), participated on the External Planning Committee for the 2004 IRC. Cindy Sutliff, AIRA Executive Director, and Bill Brand, AIRA President, represented AIRA on this committee. AIRA is a co-sponsor of the conference.

#### National Immunization Registry Strategic Plan 2002–2007

In 2001 to 2002, AIRA and a broad range of other stakeholder organizations worked with the CDC/NIP to produce a strategic plan for reaching the Healthy People 2010 national objective: to increase to 95% the proportion of children (ages 0 - < 6 years) participating in a fully operational, population-based immunization registry. AIRA Board members and committee chairpersons serve as stewards for each of the focus areas. Bill Brand and Therese Hoyle are stewards for partnerships, Sherry Riddick is steward for provider participation, Katie Reed is steward for education, Barbara Canavan is steward for data quality and data use, Kim Salisbury-Keith is steward for privacy and confidentiality, Sue Salkowitz is steward for technical capabilities, and Ellen Wild and Kim Salisbury-Keith are stewards for integration. AIRA stewards work collaboratively with the CDC/NIP stewards on advancing the implementation of the plan.

### II. Providing a “Voice” for Registries

*AIRA members participate in national workgroups, taskforces, and ad hoc committees to provide a voice for immunization registry stakeholders. These include:*

#### Health Care Provider Workgroup (HCPWG)

Convened by the CDC/NIP to examine provider participation challenges and to make recommendations for increasing provider participation in immunization registries, the HCPWG includes representatives of medical professional organizations, health plans, AIRA, ECBT, and other stakeholders. The HCPWG is supported in its work by the AIRA Provider Participation Committee. This AIRA committee, chaired by Sherry Riddick, is charged with collecting provider participation best practices from the registry community and developing resources to be used by state and local registries to increase provider participation in their areas. Sherry Riddick serves on the HCPWG along with Katie Reed, AIRA Education Committee Chair, and Barbara Canavan, AIRA Board Treasurer.

### Privacy & Confidentiality Committee

Bill Brand and Kim Salisbury-Keith have represented AIRA on both the CDC Privacy and Confidentiality (P & C) calls and the Confidentiality Work Group (CWG). The P & C calls are used to inform registry projects about current confidentiality issues and to allow discussion on a variety of related issues, such as HIPAA, FERPA, notification, and inter-state sharing.

The Confidentiality Work Group (CWG) developed the Registry Certification criteria for confidentiality and a process for assessing compliance based on the Community Registries Immunization Manual Chapter on Confidentiality. (The Technical Work Group previously developed certification procedures for eleven other standards.) Draft materials include an application for certification, a checklist of requirements, a list of documents needed for review, and a list of related questions for a certification site visit. Pilot testing will be conducted at several states that indicated on the 2003 IRAR that they have: a written confidentiality policy currently implemented; a policy that has been reviewed and found to be in compliance with federal, state and local legislation; a policy that has been reviewed and found to be consistent with the minimum specifications contained in Chapter 2, Appendix B of the Community Immunization Registry Manual.

### Vaccine Safety and Registry Community (VASREC) Work Group

A collaboration of AIRA and the CDC/NIP, the VASREC work group serves as a forum for consensus development, problem solving, and feedback to CDC/NIP on issues, topics, and concerns relating to closer integration of vaccine safety information into immunization registries, and electronic reporting from registries into the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS). This work group meets monthly and is open to members of the immunization registry community who are interested in these issues. Cindy Sutliff, AIRA Executive Director, participates on the committee. This year, supported by the TaskForce for Child Survival through a grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, members of the VASREC team met in Atlanta, GA. This work session was designed to refine a consensus-based description document that captures the activities and data flow of immunization information systems that report to the VAERS. A plan for the review and distribution of the functional requirements document was also developed. Twenty-three people participated in this work session. This material was presented at the immunization coalition conference and will also be presented at the annual registry conference.

### Public Health Information Infrastructure (PHIN)

The CDC's Public Health Information Network (PHIN) is an effort to build a common standards-based framework for public health information systems across the nation that results in cost savings and rapid deployment. The second annual PHIN Conference was held by CDC in Atlanta, GA on May 24-27, 2004. The conference brought together key stakeholder organizations and partners to explore how the PHIN can support and transform areas such as preparedness and response, integrated child health, and interaction with clinical medicine. AIRA Ex-Officio Board Member, Sue Salkowitz and AIRA member, Marty LaVenture, MN, represented AIRA at this year's conference. Presentations by AIRA Preparedness Committee Co-Chairs, Paula Soper and Karen Nikolai were part of the conference workshop sessions. In addition, the AKC/PHIL, a partner organization of AIRA, presented outcomes of the Connections Community of Practice (COP) initiative as well as a report on findings from a deduplication project, The Challenge of De-Duplication in Person-Centric Systems.

### National Health Information Infrastructure (NHII) Conference

A special *Secretarial Summit on Health Information Technology* launched this year's National Health Information Infrastructure (NHII) Conference: *Cornerstones for Electronic Healthcare*. As an endorser of the conference, AIRA participated in the conference poster session and was listed in the conference program. The AIRA logo appeared on all conference printed and electronic materials. Cindy Sutliff, AIRA Executive Director, participated in the one day Summit along with Sue Salkowitz, AIRA Ex-Officio Board member, and Marty LaVenture, AIRA member. Both Sue and Marty represented AIRA throughout the two-day working sessions of the conference, participating in the public health stakeholders group that followed the Summit.

### Advocacy

AIRA Officers and Board of Directors continue to monitor key issues, trends, policies, and positions that may have an impact on immunization registries.

The National Vaccine Program Office held a day and a half meeting to discuss reactions to the Institute of Medicine (IOM) report, "Financing Vaccines in the 21st Century." Groups represented at the meeting included manufacturers, federal, state, and local health agencies, distributors, purchasers, health care providers and consumer groups. The Association of Immunization Managers (AIM), along with the CDC and NAACHO, provided the federal, state, and local health departments' perspectives. AIRA President Bill Brand, in collaboration with members

of the AIRA Board, drafted a statement that was incorporated into the AIM presentation made by Claire Hannan, Executive Director. In its statement, AIRA urged that any recommendations from the committee related to vaccine funding and supply not jeopardize existing 317 or other funding to immunization projects and their registries.

### III. Furthering the Work of Local Registries

*AIRA committees provide a forum for AIRA members working in state and local immunization registries to exchange information and lessons learned. This year's committee activities included the following:*

#### Education Committee

This year the Education Committee met via conference call bi-monthly. Members researched and produced four editions of the *SnapShots* newsletter, that was distributed to over 800 people via broadcast e-mail and posted on the AIRA web site. A special conference edition of *SnapShots* was distributed to all attendees of the 2003 IRC. This committee worked with AIRA staff to develop a Best Practice Definition for the Knowledge Sharing Repository and assisted in the development of the Registry Profile templates. The committee is now engaged in developing an education survey of AIRA members that will help identify information needs of the registry community specifically as it relates to the 2010 Healthy People Strategic Plan. Katie Reed of New York, AIRA Ex-Officio Board member, serves as Chair of the committee and Editor of the *SnapShots* newsletter.

#### Technical Committee

The focus of the Technical Committee is to identify, share and promote methods and best practices to ensure the best possible data accuracy and completeness for immunization registries. In 2004 the Technical Committee selected three projects and work is ongoing through the end of the year. The projects provide opportunities for collaboration with CIRSET, VASREC, AIRA Education Committee, CDC Technical Working Group (TWG) for registry certification standards, CDC Health Care Provider Workgroup and the AIRA PROW Committee and include the following:

- **Model Data Security Plan** a document that would serve as a model to help registries assess potential risks and vulnerabilities for safeguarding their data; sample documents that registries can use to develop a

Registry Security Plan that fits their own environment; and help for registries to be in compliance with HIPAA security standards.

- **Data Quality Profiles** techniques and standards to measure registry data accuracy and completeness; documented methods and tools that can help registries measure the completeness of registry data and monitor the impact of efforts to improve.
- **Catalog of Registry Uses:** Real-life examples of how programs use registry data and the methods to extract, deduplicate, and clean the data, with the focus on back-end processes needed to prepare the data for aggregate studies, technical tools used, definition of data elements, and standard reports that every registry should be able to generate; documentation of the impact of each data use and its relevance to program goals and PROW standards.

Barbara Canavan of Oregon, AIRA Board Treasurer, and Steve Levy of Massachusetts, AIRA member, co-chair this committee.

#### Emergency Preparedness and Response Committee

Formed during the 2002 AIRA Annual Meeting, the AIRA Emergency Preparedness and Response (EPR) Committee meets monthly and is co-chaired by AIRA members Karen Nikolai of Minnesota and Paula Soper of Maryland. The Committee provides a forum for the exchange of experience, best practices and ideas for the use of registries in EPR.

The Committee was very active during 2004. Fifty-two (52) immunization registries nationwide participated in a web-based EPR survey. In addition to a presentation planned for the 2004 IRC, the Committee presented the survey results at both the 2004 National Immunization Conference (NIC) and the 2004 PHIN Conference. The Committee also utilized AIRA organizational resources to educate key national partners and stakeholders on the potential uses of immunization registries for preparedness and response activities. Based on survey results, the Committee has planned an AIRA pre-conference workshop for the 2004 IRC.

#### Urban/City Registries Committee

This committee provides a monthly forum for representatives of Boston, Chicago, Detroit, New York City, Philadelphia, Texas and other sites to exchange information and engage in problem-solving on issues such as city-state relationships, provider participation, and data exchange with managed care organizations. The committee has launched a special project to promote real-time integration of immunization registries with provider clinical information systems. Lennon Turner and Amy Metroka of New York City are the current co-chairs of this committee.

### Provider Participation Committee

This committee is led by Sherry Riddick of Washington state, currently also serving as AIRA steward for the provider participation focus area of the CDC/NIP immunization registry strategic plan. Activities in 2004 have focused on:

- **Development of a survey of registry and immunization program staff** to identify best practices implemented to overcome the most common barriers, technical and non-technical, encountered in recruiting and retaining provider participation in registries. The survey is web-based and will be followed up with telephone interviews.
- The **identification and review of documents related to provider participation** for posting on the AIRA Knowledge Sharing Repository.

The information gathered through these activities will inform the committee's recommendations to the CDC/NIP's Health Care Provider Workgroup (HCPWG), which is charged with developing a national strategy for increasing provider participation.

## IV. Developing Partnerships

### ECBT Managed Care Organization (MCO)/Registry Data Exchange Initiative

Aurora Oliva, AIRA Resource Development Manager, worked closely with ECBT staff, Jennifer Zanolinsky, and members of the MCO/Registry Advisory Committee to develop and produce the MCO/Registry Data Exchange resource document, **Partnering with Health Plans: A Practical Guide**. Printed copies of the guide were distributed to all immunization registry programs as well as to the immunization programs. In addition, an interactive version of the guide is posted on the ECBT web site at [www.ecbt.org](http://www.ecbt.org).

AIRA convened an MCO/Immunization Registry Implementation Team that is chaired by Therese Hoyle, AIRA President-Elect. Team members in turn convened a Capacity Building Workgroup of immunization registries that are interested in discussing issues related to data exchange with managed care organizations and in learning from the best practices of "mentor" immunization registries that are currently involved in data exchange with managed care organizations.

### Committee on Immunization Registry Standards for Electronic Transactions (CIRSET)

AIRA has established a partnership with CIRSET to leverage the resources and expertise of both organizations. With that goal in mind, the following activities were initiated during 2004 and include: integration of the CIRSET web page into the AIRA web site domain; creation of a CIRSET Special Interest Group (SIG) page for the ongoing work of this committee; incorporation of CIRSET list management into the AIRA list management system and the establishment of a transition team to plan and develop a plan for integration of the CIRSET functions into the AIRA organizational structure. In addition, CIRSET worked closely with the AIRA Technical Committee to plan and present a data quality workshop at the 2003 IRC and actively participated on the VASREC Workgroup.

### Providing Resources and Forums for Information-Sharing

AIRA provides a source of registry-relevant information and a forum for information sharing to its immunization registry constituency and the wider public health community. The development of toolkits and guides and the dissemination of timely immunization information are just some of the activities that support AIRA's role in facilitating a vibrant community of practice around immunization registries. Specific accomplishments this year in support of this goal include the following:

- Launched the expanded AIRA web site, which featured three new tools for communication and knowledge sharing.
  - **Knowledge Sharing Repository (KSR)** A searchable database of registry-relevant information that currently houses almost 300 documents and is updated regularly. An online *KSR Document Submission Guide* was written and posted to facilitate the collection of useful documents.
  - **Registry Profiles** A searchable database of key information about most registries in the United States. Contact information and technical features are just two of the pieces of data stored on each registry profile.
  - **Special Interest Group (SIG) Section** Work areas for AIRA's standing and ad-hoc committees. File sharing and discussion forums are some of the features built into these SIGs. There is also a "Members Only" SIG for AIRA members to easily connect with one another.
- Other new features incorporated into the AIRA web site include:
  - **Online membership application.** New members can sign up and previous members can renew their AIRA membership directly online.

- **Online registration** for AIRA's pre-conference workshops.
- Implementation of an **online survey application** to be used by AIRA's committees to gather information via surveys and polls.
- An **online calendar** is used to keep users informed on upcoming conferences, meetings and other relevant events.
- **Scrolling News Spotlight** banner on the web site home page alerts and links users to important and timely **news and trends**.
- Resources provided by AIRA for use by immunization registries include:
  - A **Best Practice Template** was designed and posted on the AIRA web site to encourage the submission and sharing of documented best practices.
  - Distributed the AIRA *SnapShots* newsletter quarterly via broadcast e-mail to over 800 people and posted it on the AIRA Web site.
  - Distributed the CDC's *Immunization Works* bulletin via broadcast e-mail and posted it on the AIRA Web site.
- Developed and distributed the following AIRA tools and guides for use by immunization registries in 2003-2004:
  - *PROW Standards of Excellence* Document (second printing)
  - *Partnering with Health Plans: A Practical Guide*
  - MCO Data Exchange "How To Guide": *Partnering with Health Plans: A Practical Guide, A Resource for Immunization Registry Staff*
  - *Fundraising Toolkit*
  - *Provider Participation Marketing and Communications: A Workbook for Immunization Registries*
  - *Achieving Quality and Completeness of Registry Data: A Workbook for Immunization Registries*
- AIRA coordinates monthly conference call meetings for the AIRA Board of Directors and the CDC/NIP. These meetings also include AIRA partner organizations ECBT, All Kids Count/Public Health Informatics Institute, CIRSET and the Association of Immunization Managers (AIM). This year the Indian Health Services (IHS) joined as a partner organization. Calls focus on sharing information regarding implementation of the CDC/NIP Immunization Registry Strategic Plan 2002-2007 and discussion of issues/hot topics that impact immunization registries.

## VI. Providing Education & Training

*Education and training opportunities coordinated by AIRA included the following:*

- Two pre-conference workshops held at the 2003 Immunization Registry Conference in Atlanta, GA.
  - *Achieving Quality and Completeness of Registry Data: Methods and Techniques*. Workshop leaders for this workshop were Barbara Canavan, AIRA Technical Committee co-chair, Steve Levy, AIRA Technical Committee co-chair, Katie Reed, AIRA Education Committee chair and Janet Kelly, NIP Registry Support Branch.
  - *Building Provider Partnerships: Using Marketing Strategies to Promote Your Registry*. Workshop leaders for this workshop were Maureen Murphy, AIRA Provider Participation Committee member and Laurie Dietsch and Stacy Osburn, AIRA members.
- A progress report on the implementation of the *PROW Standards of Excellence* by the 13 demonstration sites was presented at the 2004 Program Managers Annual Meeting. Bill Brand, AIRA President, co-presented with Robert Grenwelge, PHA from the Houston-Harris County Immunization Registry Program, TX. In addition, PROW demonstration site outcomes were highlighted at the 2004 NIC held in Nashville, TN and at the 2003 IRC.
- Noam Arzt, AIRA Sustaining Member and President of HLN Consulting LLC, represented AIRA during the Public Health Data Standards Consortium (PHDSC) meetings on the development of "use cases" for immunization registries related to the HL7 functional standard for electronic health records (EHR). PHDSC was commended by NCVHS for their White Paper on public health functions, and the HL7 functional standard for the EHR has been approved by the HL7 Board. In addition, Sue Salkowitz, AIRA Ex-Officio Board member, represented AIRA in a number of PHDSC meetings, as well as at their annual conference in Washington, D.C.

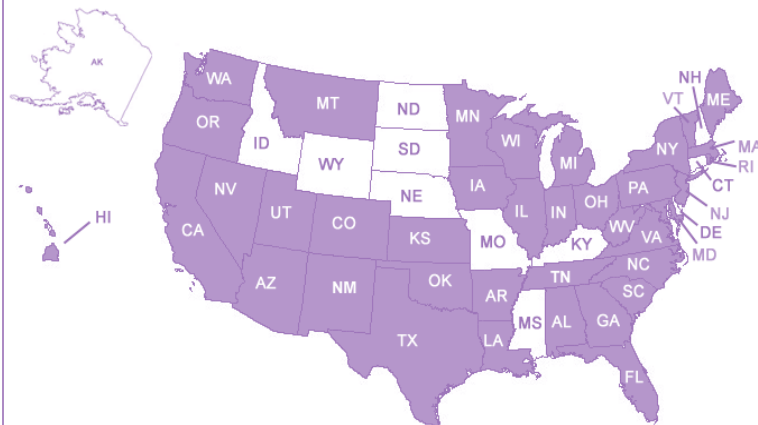
